## A BILL

To preserve the cooperative, peaceful uses of space for the benefit of all humankind by prohibiting the basing of weapons in space and the use of weapons to destroy or damage objects in space that are in orbit, and for other purposes.

### 1 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

2	This Act may be cited as the "Space Preservation Act

4	SEC. 2. REAFFIRMATION OF POLICY ON THE PRESERVA-
5	TION OF PEACE IN SPACE.

7	102(a) of the National Aeronautics and Space Act of 1958
8	(42 U.S.C. 2451(a)), stating that it "is the policy of the

1	SEC. 4. INTERNATIONAL TREATY BANNING SPACE-BASED

4	The President shall direct the United States rep-
5	resentatives to the United Nations and other international
6	organizations to immediately work toward negotiating,
7	adopting, and implementing an international treaty ban-
8	ning space-based weapons and the use of weapons to de-
9	stroy or damage objects in space that are in orbit.
10	SEC. 5. REPORT.
11	The President shall submit to Congress not later than
12	90 days after the date of the enactment of this Act, and
13	every 6 months thereafter, a report on—
14	(1) the implementation of the ban on space-
15	based weapons and the use of weapons to destroy or
16	damage objects in space that are in orbit required
17	by section 3; and
18	(2) progress toward negotiating, adopting, and
19	implementing the treaty described in section 4.
20	SEC. 6. SPACE-BASED NONWEAPONS ACTIVITIES.
21	Nothing in this Act may be construed as prohibiting
22	the use of funds for—
23	(1) space exploration;
24	(2) space research and development;
25	(3) testing, manufacturing, or production that
26	is not related to space-based weapons or systems; or

1	(4) civil, commercial, or defense activities (in

5	SEC. 7. DEFINITIONS.
6	In this Act:
7	(1) The term "space" means all space extend
8	ing upward from an altitude greater than 110 kilo
9	meters above the surface of the earth and any celes
10	tial body in such space.
11	(2) The terms "space-based weapon" and
12	"space-based system" mean a device capable of dam
13	aging or destroying an object or person (whether in
14	outer space, in the atmosphere, or on Earth) by—
15	(A) firing one or more projectiles to collide
16	with that object or person;
17	(B) detonating one or more explosive de
18	vices in close proximity to that object or person

20	(C) any other undeveloped means.
