The Premier League in the Eye of the Sportswashing Storm

On Thursday, April 21st, Peter Frankental joined us via Zoom to give a talk on Sportswashing and how that general phenomenon describes the recent takeover of Newcastle United by a team of investors who are backed by the Saudi government's wealth fund. Peter is the Economic Affairs Programme Director at Amnesty International and was extremely knowledgeable about the situation.

Peter started his talk by noting that the NUFC situation is basically at its end for now. The club has been purchased and that's not likely to change any time soon. So, he thought it would be best to trace the journey up to this point since Amnesty International has been involved in this from the beginning.

First, Peter offered a quick definition of the term we are talking about, which accords well with the one currently on Wikipedia:

<u>Sportswashing</u> is "the practice of an individual, group, corporation, or nation-state using sport to improve their tarnished reputation, through hosting a sporting event, the purchase or sponsorship of sporting teams, or by participation in the sport itself. At nation-state level, sportswashing has been used to direct attention away from a poor human rights record and corruption scandals within government."

Peter noted three classic examples of this. The 1934 World Cup held in Italy as a boost to Mussolini. The 1936 Olympic Games held in Berlin as propaganda for Nazi Germany. And the 1974 World Cup held in Argentina while its military dictatorship was throwing people into the sea.

Amnesty International's primary reason for existing is to help expose violations of Human Rights, so when the Newcastle takeover was proposed, the group knew this was an opportunity they could not miss. Fortunately for their cause, this was an issue that journalists also wanted to talk about because of the <u>Assassination of Jamal Khashoggi</u> who was a fellow journalist.

The publicity raised by Amnesty put Newcastle United and local politicians in the eye of the storm. As a result, Newcastle MP Chi Onwurah hosted a public event on

4 May 2020 that included the fiancé of Khashoggi as well as representatives from Amnesty. Thousands of people attended online. The vast majority of them were in favour of the takeover because they have been desperate to see the club do well.

The government ordered a fan-led review of the issues, while the media and Amnesty kept the situation in the news. The focus was switched, however, from Newcastle United, to the Premier League. This takeover raised serious questions about the Owners and Directors Test, which is meant to outline requirements that would prohibit an individual from becoming an owner or director of a club. Amnesty asked the PL to incorporate Human Rights into their ODT, which generated a lot of media attention. Eventually, the PL met with Amnesty to discuss what Human Rights compliance test standards could be considered.

That is basically where we are now. But since a majority of clubs must vote to approve whatever rules gets proposed, Peter thought that it was unlikely to actually happen. He noted that Turkeys don't vote for Christmas! And other club owners have issues they don't want to be examined, such as when Chelsea owner Roman Abramovich <u>funded illegal Jewish settlers</u> in what has been considered a war crime.

All of this has knocked the idea on the head that sports can be considered as separate from politics. Sports is far too dominated by business and money, which are both inextricably linked with politics. One big question was on everyone's mind at the end of Peter's talk. What can fans do about this?

Peter noted that fans can exert pressure. See, for example, how Mike Ashley was pushed out of Newcastle, and how the <u>European Super League</u> was squashed.

Since fans can have some effect on things, this means they have some responsibility. The purchase of any commodity has consequences. However, Peter was quick to point out that the Government and the football institutions are the ones who bear far more responsibility. The players are not the ones at fault. They are often told to pipe down. So, fans ought to direct their efforts towards the right groups. For example, the home end at a Crystal



Palace game recently put up a big display about Saudi Human Rights abuses. NUFC could do the same through fan sites to keep reminding the world of what is happening. Every example is a blow against Human Rights abuses. For updated information on this, you can always see Amnesty's website for their report on Saudi Arabia or other countries.

The Secret of Life and Where Type 2 Diabetes Fits In Thursday, May 19th with Professor Roy Taylor

Do you ever wonder what happens to your food after you eat it? Did you know that your body sees little of this food? There is so much chat about nutrition and so little

understanding of what is really going on.

And then there is the scourge of our age — type 2 diabetes. Newcastle research over the last 20 years has pieced together the puzzle of why people get this condition and how it is possible to escape from it. They have used special MRI scanning to see what is happening inside you. All of this has led to the current NHS programme being rolled out aiming for remission of type 2 diabetes.

Roy Taylor is Professor of Medicine and Metabolism at Newcastle University and Consultant at Newcastle Hospitals NHS Trust. He founded the Newcastle Magnetic Resonance Centre in 2006 to develop innovative research techniques, and by 2011 he was able to show that excess fat within liver and pancreas caused type 2 diabetes. The low-calorie liquid diet was developed as a research tool to show what was causing high sugar levels, but it proved so successful that he then tested it as a treatment for type 2 diabetes. He has written many scientific papers as well as an easy-read book about life without diabetes. Professor Taylor also developed the system now used throughout the United Kingdom for screening for diabetic eye disease, with major reduction in blindness due to diabetes across the UK.



Update from Microgrant Recipient Ninebanks

Regular readers of the bulletin will know that from July 2021 until the end of January 2022, North East Humanists offered a Community Fund where microgrants of up to £500 were offered to local charities. We donated more than £5000 through this fund and work on the projects is still being completed. Recently, we received an update from one of our awardees — the Ninebanks Church and Community Hall Group.

Ninebanks operates a public building for the rural community of West Allen Parish in the North Pennines (2011 population of 279). Their hall plays an important part in village life because they have no shop, school, pub, or public transport. The hall is now the only place where the local people can come together. It is where all local events happen, including bingo nights, ceilidhs, keep fit classes, and the monthly "pop up pub" social evenings. It is the venue for birthday parties and wakes, the polling station, and a public meeting place. Unfortunately, their existing kitchen was aging and in need of refurbishment to be brought up to modern standards. Our grant of a few hundred pounds was given to help them install a new oven and hob.

Recently, Helen Manson wrote to us on behalf of the Ninebanks Church and Community Hall Group to report that all of the building work has been completed and the kitchen equipment covered by our grant has been installed. Helen sent us the following photos of their lovely new kitchen and asked us to please pass on thanks to all of our members for their kind donation to this refurbishment project.

Recently, Humanists UK released their new <u>2025 Strategy document</u>.
